Program — Residents of the Tri-County area saw a significant improvement in their emergency medical options earlier this spring when a helicopter ambulance started operating from the Sidney Municipal Airport.

Steve Anderson gave the Rotarians an overview of the services of LifeNet of New York. The Sidney aircraft is the 7th in LifeNet's fleet with others based at Albany Medical Center, Catskill Regional Medical Center, and the villages of Glen, Walkill, and Hornell in New York State and Guthrie One across the border in Sayre, PA.



Anderson stressed the high medical qualifications of the staff on each helicopter. The team coordinates with local emergency squads and area hospitals to assess the patient's medical needs and then move him to the best facility for treatment. Ray and Patti Howland of the Morris squad were in attendance to hear Anderson's presentation.

Rotary Adds New Avenue of Service

Representatives at the 2010 Council on Legislation approved an enactment to add a fifth Avenue of Service: New Generations.

After adopting an amendment to change the name from Youth Service, as originally proposed, to New Generations, the Council narrowly supported the addition to article 5 of the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. The 263-250 vote was received by surprised gasps and applause after a short debate.

New Generations joins Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service, and International Service as the foundation of club activity. Before starting a project, Rotarians are asked to think broadly about how their club and its members could contribute within each avenue.

"It's a significant change – a historic day in Rotary," said Council Chair Mark Daniel Maloney. "Rotarians have always strongly supported youth activities even though they were never part of the four Avenues of Service. I think this strengthens our commitment."

The Avenue of New Generations recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding.

Representative Ronald P. Sekkel, of District 5170 (California, USA), proposed the enactment by saying that New Generations is the future of Rotary.

Going High Tech

Rotary Council Approves e-Clubs

After more than an hour of debate, district representatives at the 2010 Council on Legislation voted Monday to make e-clubs a permanent part of Rotary International. The measure, approved by a vote of 430 to 85, received loud applause.

"This will allow Rotarians with physical disabilities or [scheduling] restraints to meet regularly and conduct service projects through the Internet," said RI Director Antonio Hallage as he presented the proposal to the Council.

Submitted by seven Rotary e-clubs along with the RI Directors, the measure makes permanent e-clubs.

Rotary's 14 e-clubs boast 360 members in 30 countries and geographical areas, and 586 service projects. Eclubs conduct meetings in Chinese, English, Finnish, Greek, Portuguese, and Spanish. Collectively, they have contributed almost US\$150,000 to the Foundation.

US/Canada Get Rotarian Magazine On-line

Rotarians in the United States and Canada will be allowed to choose between receiving the print or an electronic copy of **The Rotarian** magazine following an action taken by the Council on Legislation.

But representatives voted against giving a similar option to Rotarians outside the US and Canada, who receive either **The Rotarian** or one of 31 regional magazines published by the Rotary World Magazine Press. The Council also rejected a proposal to do away with the subscription requirement altogether.

It was stressed that print magazines are a powerful tool for marketing to non-Rotarians and serve as Rotary's primary way of reaching members in remote areas.

Proponents of the choice argued that RI already has used online technology with great success, pointing to the recent transition of the print publication Rotary World to the electronic newsletter **Rotary Leader**.

"The magazine should be available at all times," said Patricia M. Kasuda (District 7620). "With today's technology and RI's partnership with Google Books, readers will get the same full-color articles the print magazine offers."

Opponents noted that advertising revenues could decline and worried that the action could eventually lead to the demise of the print magazine.

About 450,000 Rotarians in North America and 50,000 elsewhere receive **The Rotarian**. The remaining 700,000 Rotarians subscribe to a regional magazine.
